| The only logical response to inerrant Scripture, then, is to preach it <i>expositionally</i> . By expositionally, I mean preaching in such a way that the meaning of the Bible passage is presented <i>entirely</i> and <i>exactly</i> as it was intended by God. In exposition, on the other hand, the passage is studied as a whole, and with attention to the flow of thought or sequence of events.
